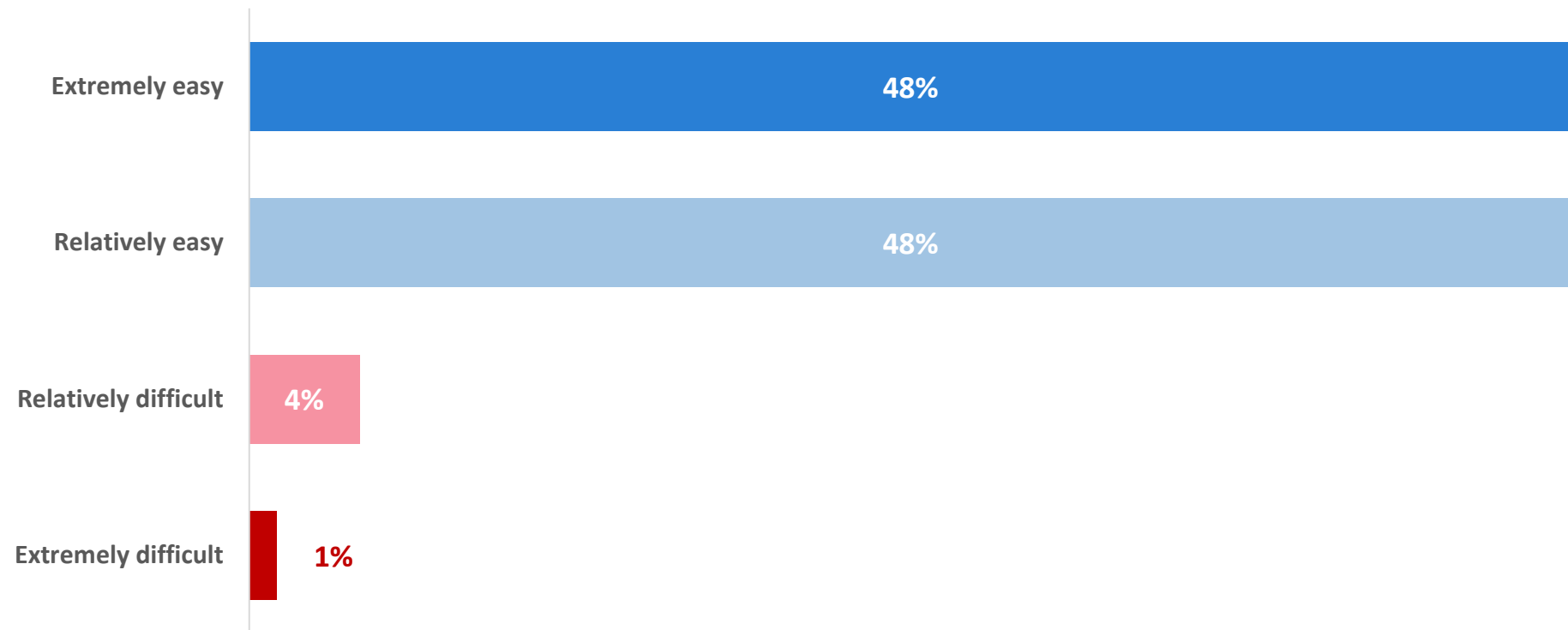

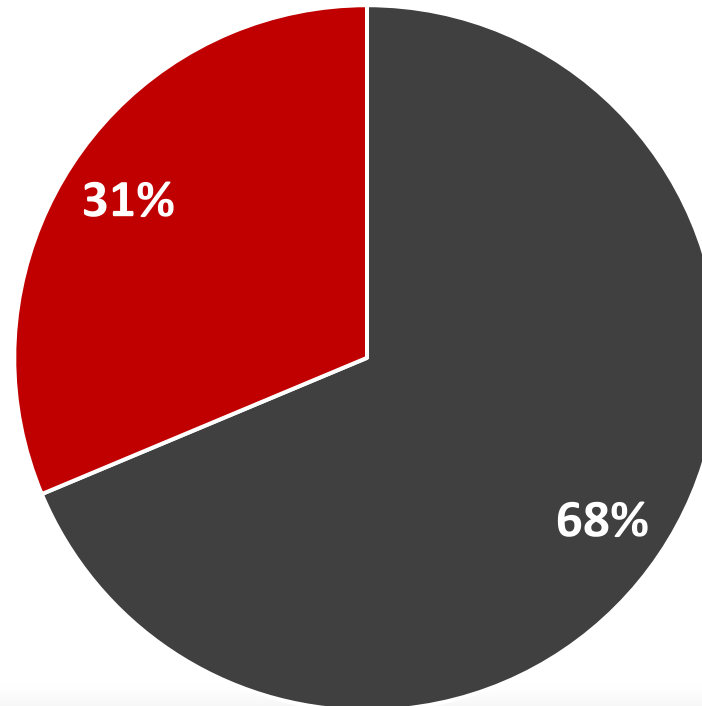


Who Should Decide Voting Rules?

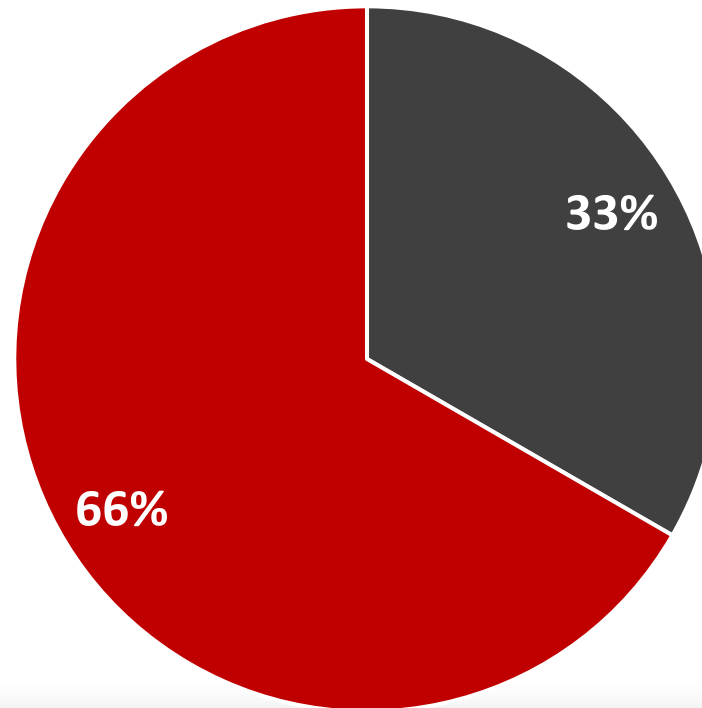


Goal Of Voting Reforms

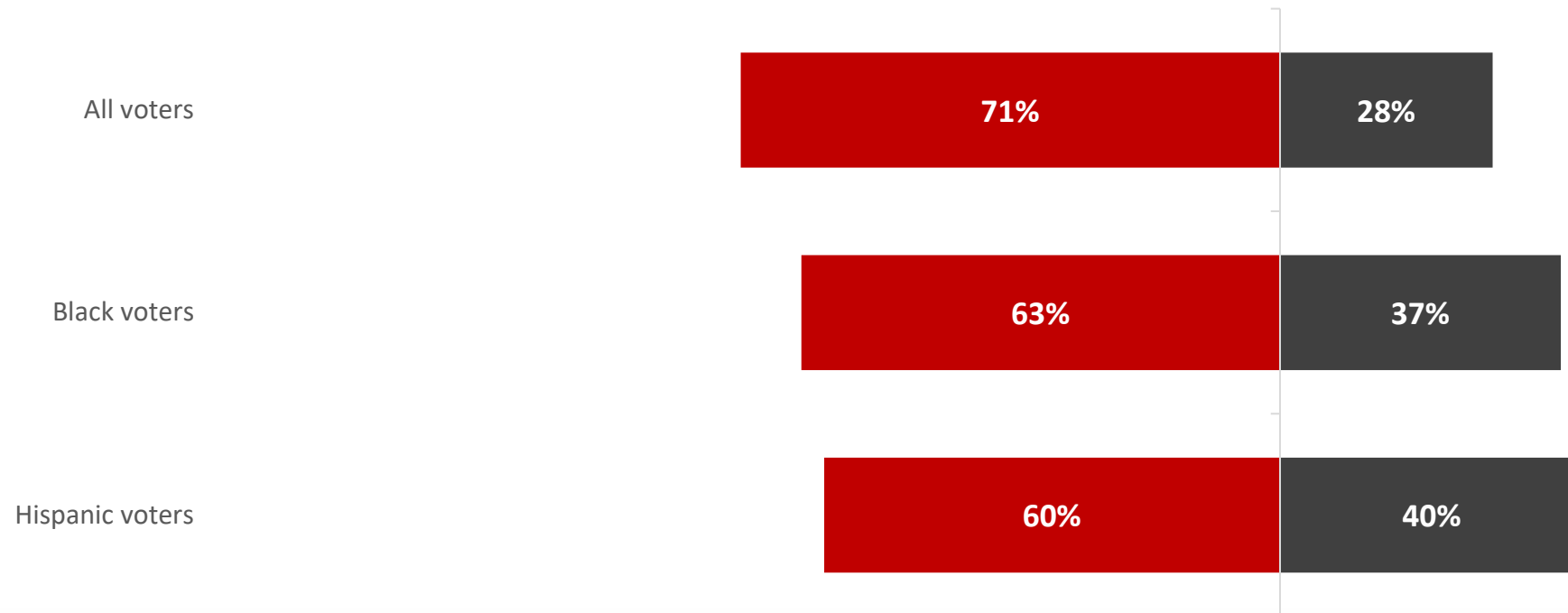


Views On Requiring Photo ID To Vote

Requiring a photo ID to vote hurts Black and Latino voters who are more likely to lack a photo ID and have limited ability to easily obtain one.

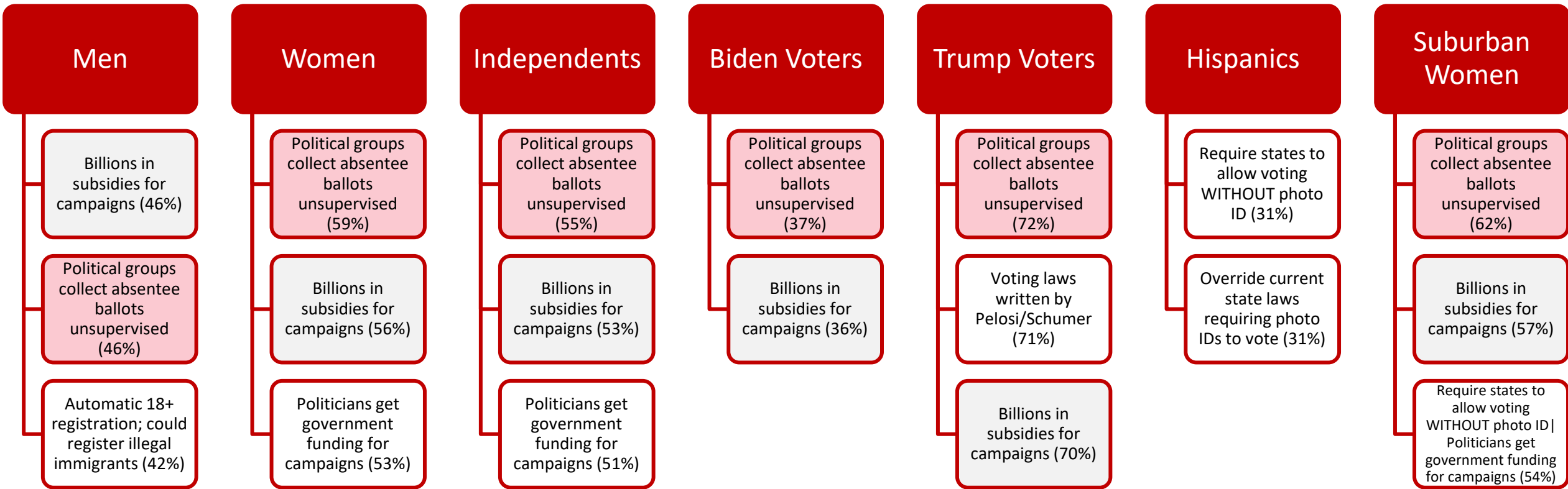


Strongest Opposition to S.1 Components

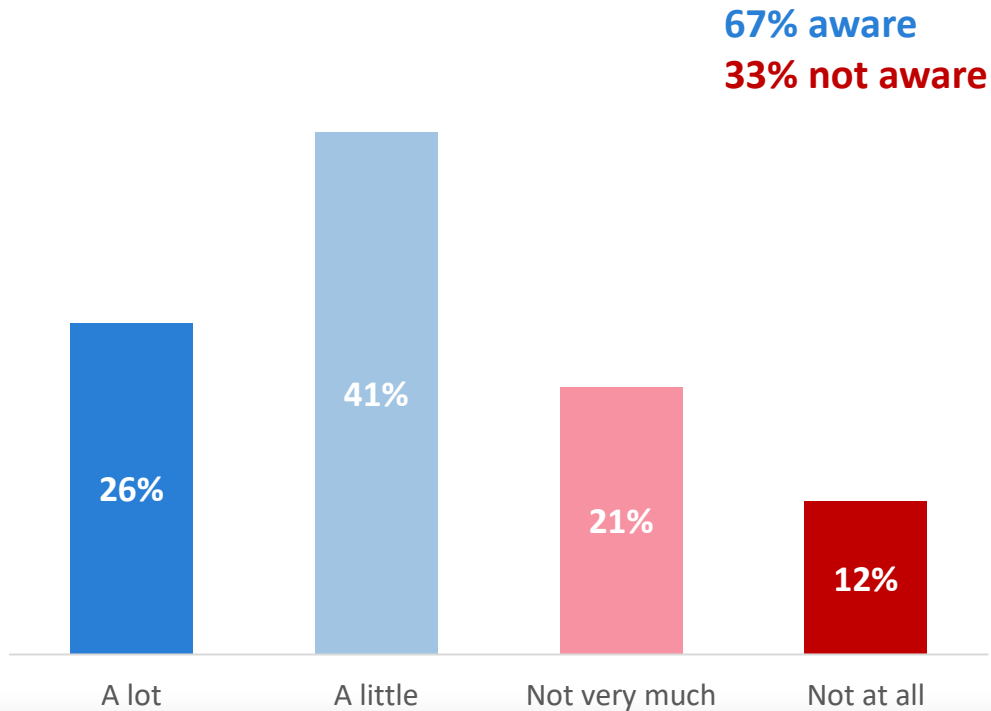

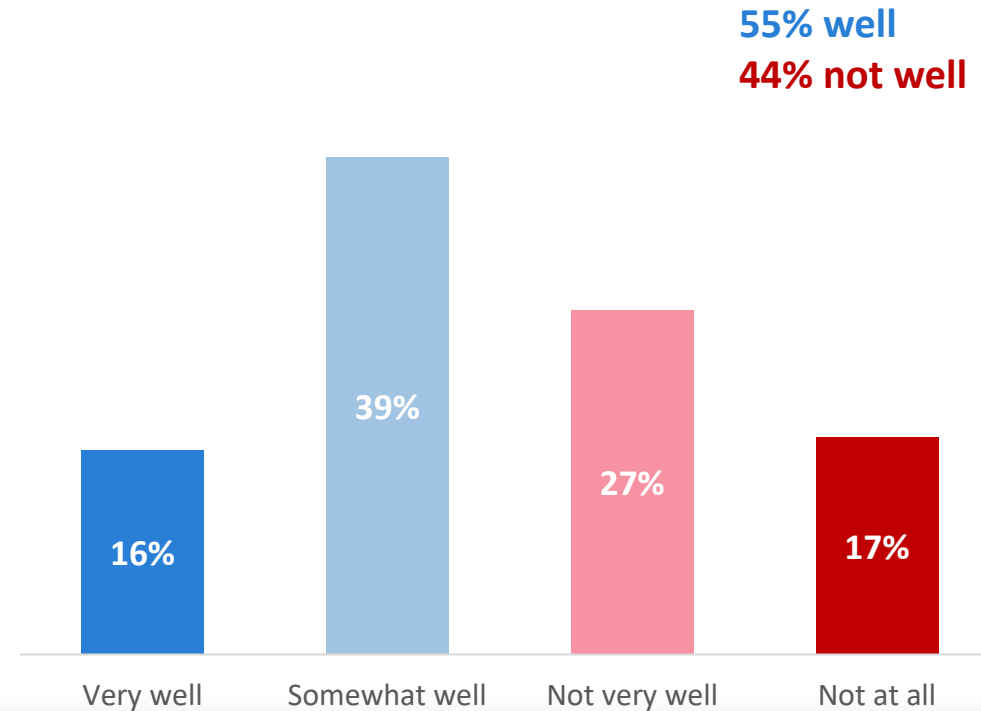


Filibuster Awareness

Another issue in the news is the Senate filibuster. Overall, how much have you seen, read or heard about the Senate filibuster in recent months?



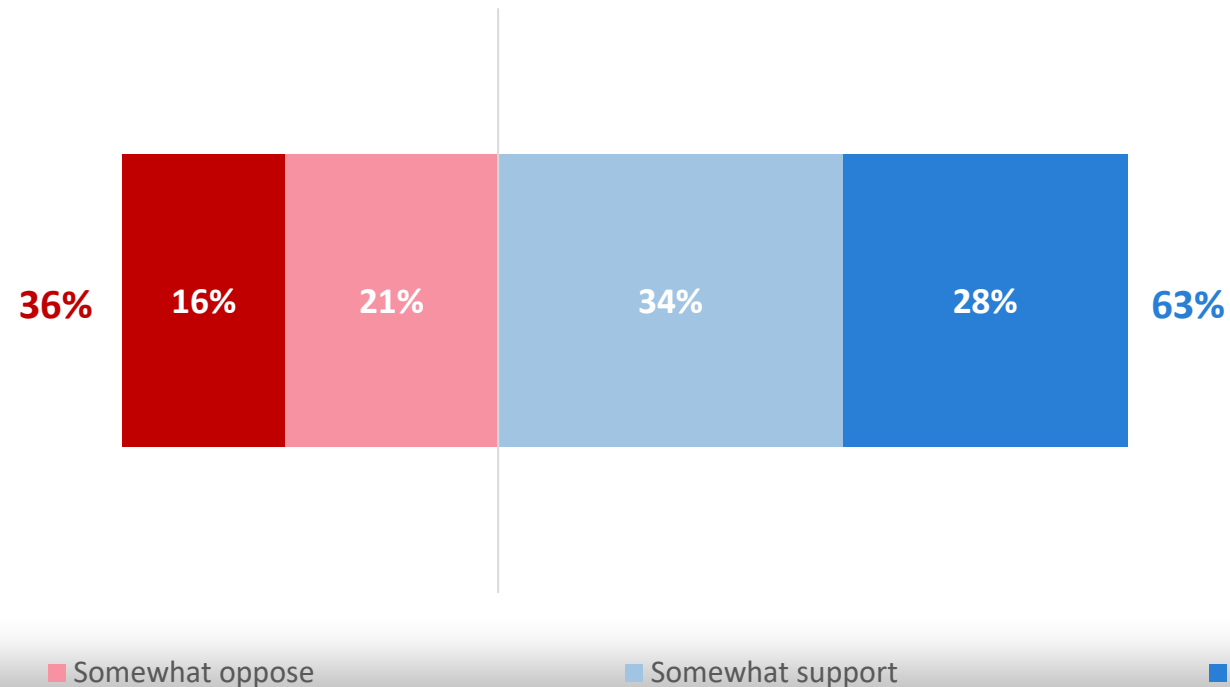

Support For Keeping The Filibuster

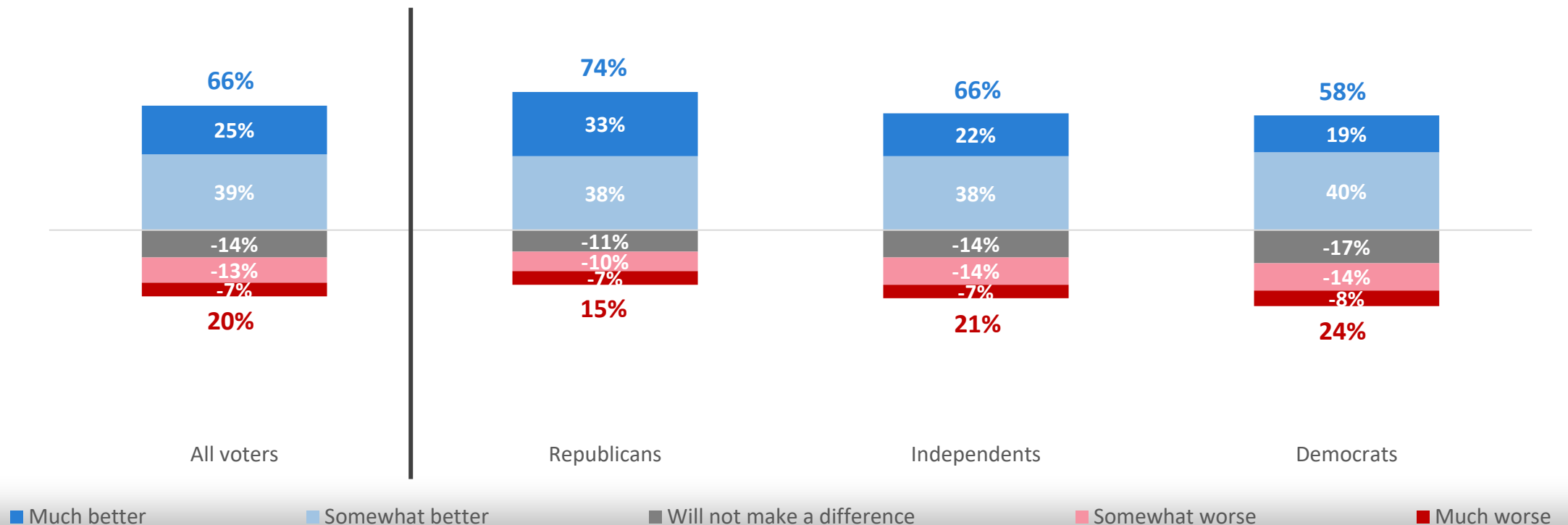
The filibuster allows any U.S. Senator to prolong or stop legislation until 60 Senators vote to end the filibuster and vote on the legislation. In a closely divided Congress, it is used by the minority party to stop legislation that disagrees with to force a compromise on the legislation or stop it entirely. Compromising = Better Laws

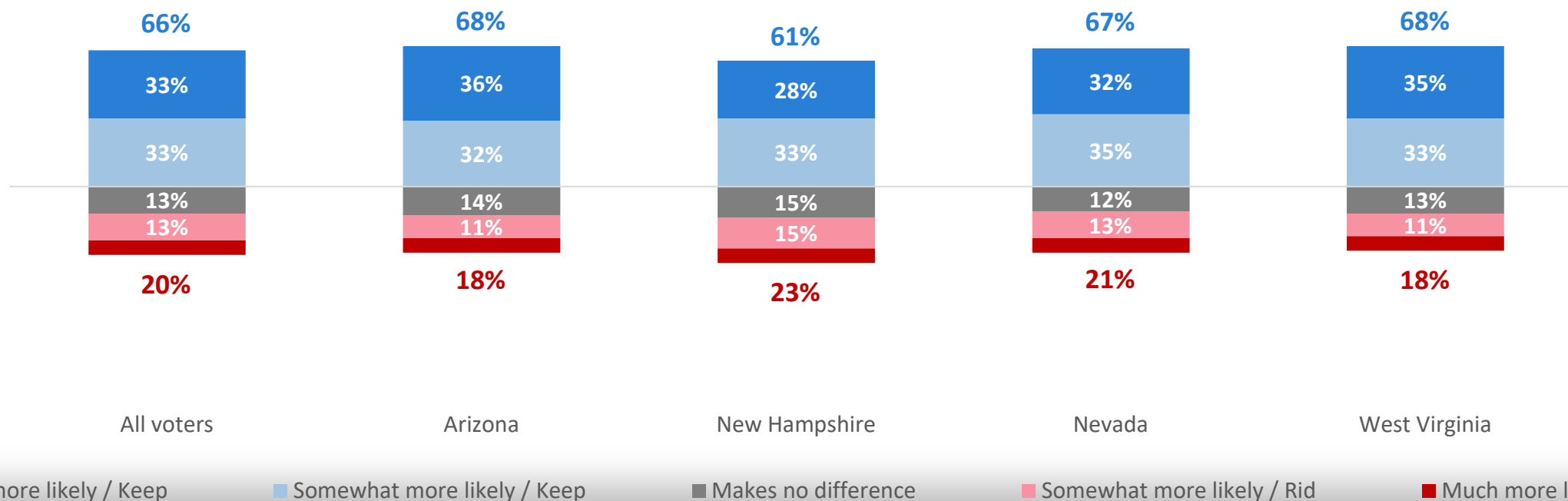
